Apalachicola - 1844 - Sept. 8-9th The eye of the storm moved over Apalachicola after moving across the state from E to W. Damage was noted in the city from this storm. The storm was likely small but intense. Sandrik counted this storm as a hurricane for NE Florida. (Sandrik 1999) The center of this storm moved across the Florida coast S of St. Augustine. Ho's estimate of central pressure was 950 mb with an RMW of 12 nmi. No significant wind damage or shifts recorded in St. Augustine. Ho asserts that this storm may have been the most severe 19th century storm to hit N Florida, but Sandrik disagrees with this assertion. (Sandrik 1999) Reports of this storm's effects on Apalachicola and Tallahassee are described in Ludlum (1963). The damage appears to have been moderate, with no mention of any lives lost. 100 Miles
